The Grouped parish Council of Flixton, St Cross \& St Margaret South Elmham met at Batemans Barn onMarch 14 .District Cllr Judy Cloke addressed the meeting advising on Food waste and proposed expansion of the AD plant at Ellough. Long serving District Councillor David Ritchie was standing down at the next election, thank you David. The fencing at St Cross has been completed thanks to Countryside Supplies ,David Hill and Dick Brown.
A meeting was planned with the Housing officer regarding garages ,paths and Parking at St Felix Rise.Also discussed was the road clearing of the roadside path to the Buck.The new road sign crossing of the B1062 was expected to start soon. Voter ID for the forthcoming election was also raised, with concerns about some people being unable to vote. A meeting had been arranged to try to re open the permissive path around the Flixton Lake. There being no new nominations for this council, thus no election was held the present Councillors will continue.

I watched a mallad duck land on a puddle which is not deep enough for this exercise, and he ended up nearly on his beak. Walking down a hedgerow I was confronted by a hen pheasant advancing towards me with her wings outstretched ,obviously not happy at my presence ,so I retreated she collected her chicks from the grass and departed the scene. This is the year for deadnettle ,rednettle and several other colours ,conditions have suited it and it can be seen on banks, fields path's and roadsides, with its purple or other colour flowers. Although called a nettle the leaves do not sting, which is thought to have evolved as a defence against predators

## NEWS FROM FLIXTON

## Litter Pick

A good weather day enabled a hardy team of workers, old and young, to carry out another clean up of our village roadside verges. As usual, a fair quantity of car body trim was recovered. Much of it seems to fall off at the bend near the Church Road junction with The Street. It might be beneficial for Nissan to open up a factory somewhere around Plantation Wood .

The positive message is that litter quantities have reduced, although there still seems to be an ongoing problem in Grange Road much of it in the form of plastic cups .

## Annual Parish Meeting

This meeting is primarily held for the community to come together and discuss the principle things which have improved and might yet improve the functioning of the village for the benefit of the villagers .

Reflecting on the past year, the road/drain work in Grange Road whilst being disruptive should resolve the road flooding issues which have persisted for many years .

The poultry plant is expanding production but, in order to minimise the negative traffic effect on the village, a regular bus service now takes a majority of workers to and from the plant .

The footpath between Church Road and The Buck pub has been thoroughly cleared by staff from Breadons Gravel Pit. The attendees gave applause to Brian Beales, representing Breadons, for his effort and involvement .

There are ongoing issues regarding misuse of shared space around Saint Felix Rise. This also includes the appropriate authority, District or County, taking responsibility for the general condition and roadside trimming of the nearby copse.

The idea for a pedestrian crossing of the B1062 at the Church Road and The Street junction is still moving ahead, although still at an early stage .

The Community Speed Watch was discussed and whilst the 7
members were managing to generate letters to "speeders", the problem with unclear and often dirty speed signs doesn't help . There was a good deal of discussion regarding the degradation of these signs over many years of neglect by Suffolk Highways .

## "Getting What We Pay For"

During the Annual Parish Meeting the frustration expressed over the dirty road signs in the village, particularly those dealing with speed limits and safety, is quite natural. The view was also expressed that the Parish Councillors then go and keep the signs clean, as they obviously see the signs when they travel to and from the village.

In some degree I might support the view that the Parish Councillors should do more to ensure the signs are clean but the question which demands an answer is , "why doesn't the appropriate local government department responsible for road signs do something about maintaining them" ?

In support of our Parish Councillors, I believe they work hard trying to resolve community issues on behalf of us all. They also take no financial reward, no pay, no expenses, and there doesn't seem to be a stampede of residents wishing to take on their roles or their efforts. But, maybe over time they've become used to "memory jogging" other local government departments to get work carried out. We need to remember that we shouldn't have to go "cap in hand" in order to ensure that other's statutory duties to the community are carried out in an organised and timely manner .

The control of speeding, the dirty and damaged road signs, the recent footpath clearing, the issue over who has responsibility for trimming the copse, ongoing problems in St Felix Rise, the construction of extra parking bays in St Felix Rise, the flooding due to blocked culverts and road drains are all the neglected responsibility of authorities outside our village. Maybe we need to find a way to ensure these responsibilities are focused on .

## Buck Pub

If you're a car enthusiast the Buck is worth a visit. Club events have included Mustangs, Morgans, Jaguars, Citroens and Porsches with some superb examples of each marque on show and there are more visits planned with the Mustangs returning in

June. But recently there was a surprise visit from Europe. Pre 1905 cars from Austria , Switzerland, Germany and the Netherlands made a wonderful sight and sound and they are now planning a return, so watch this space .

The April quiz night went down very well and at the same time providing donations for Prostate Cancer Research.

The car boot sale has returned, so an opportunity to maybe link spring cleaning with making a little cash .

## THE ST JAMES CORONATION CELEBRATION

The St James Charles III Coronation Celebration was held on the $7^{\text {th }}$ May on the Hall Green and our developing Village Green behind the Village Hall. Last year's Jubilee Event provided the inspiration to do even better this year, but with a much shorter time to make the arrangements. The omens were good when the biggest ever turnout of volunteers arrived on $4^{\text {th }}$ May to help put up the village-within-a-village of 2 large marquees and 9 smaller ones. This, much to the surprise of those manning the Polling Station in the Village Hall.

By the Sunday morning the weather was fixed, site preparation was complete with all our stock of tables and chairs pressed into service supplemented with a large number of straw bales, the sound stage operational, many miles of coronation bunting strung and floral decorations around the marquees, and a very impressive raffle display. We were delighted to welcome back Mr H's Hog Roast Company to form the heart of our coronation lunch with all the essential side dishes. A wide selection of other food and salads came from around the village, with a St James dessert selection that exceeded all previous occasions - such that members of the band were seen taking a break to take photos of the spread. Speaking of the band, we were splendidly entertained by Wenhaston's Black Deak Band which played two sessions during the afternoon's feasting.

The football pitch marked out on the Village Green was in use throughout, by seemingly tireless youngsters during the early afternoon and slightly older players later. Our younger guests all received a party pack and a very large gold, chocolate-filled coronation medallion on a ribbon.

The afternoon was a huge success, thanks in no small part to those who donated their time, energy and, in many generous cases, raffle prizes, money and significant gifts in kind, all helping to make the event so enjoyable and very beneficial for the local charities we were supporting. On behalf of all the more than 170 residents, families and welcome guests who came and enjoyed the day we would like to thank the planning and coordinating team, the ground care crew, site workers, donors, Mr. H, our marvelous cooks, all who helped things run smoothly during the day and, just as importantly, those who helped clear up that evening and take down the tentage the following day.
